Dear families...



More of what's been happening at home?







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Dillon Bamford from 5SC has put this impressive piece of work together to explain what VE day is. What is VE day?

VE day is the abbreviation for Victory in Europe Day. The 8th of May 1945 is the day when the Germans surrendered to the allies in World War 2. We celebrate and remember this day, in time, as a victory against the Germans, but also to remember the people who sadly died during the war. This was some people's happiest day of their lives, after nearly 6 long, destructive years; the war in Europe was finally over. The Prime Minister, Winston Churchill announced the news on the radio at 3 o'clock. Many had big street parties, people crowded into Trafalgar Square and outside Buckingham palace where the Royal Family and the Prime Minster waved at the ecstatic crowds. Some people were so happy many jumped in the famous London fountains. People lit bonfires, shared food and decorated houses and streets with red, white and blue bunting. Pubs were open till late, people sang and danced in the street's.

But this was not the end of the war, Japan still confident kept on fighting in the Pacific and Asia. America dropped 2 atomic bombs on the Japanese cities of Nagasaki and Hiroshima. After this event the Japanese surrendered to the allies on 15th August 1945 which was called VJ day (Victory against Japan Day). This was officially the end of World War 2, but life was not normal. The devastation from the war still remained. Rationing in the United Kingdom continued for another 10 years, the items being rationed included petrol, meat, sugar, eggs, butter, sweets and clothes.

This year is the 75th anniversary of VE day. The country was going to have big celebrations, but due to the Coronavirus lockdown and implementation of social distancing this is unable to happen. Although this is very disappointing many have still celebrated this important day in history at home with our families.
