

Does love need to be a two-way street?




Creative thinking

Discussion suggestions (age 3 - 5)



Stimulus



We often use a picture of a heart to show that we love something. Let's think about the things or people that you love.

Talking Points

- Can you think of two people or things that you love?
- What is it about them that you love?
- Why do you think we use a heart picture to say we love something or someone?

Activity

- Draw a big heart on a blank sheet of paper.
- Inside the heart draw lots of pictures of things that you love. Or, cut out pictures and stick them inside your heart.
- Show your heart to a friend or family member and see what they think about it.

Discussion suggestions (age 6 - 9)



Stimulus



What do you love?

We all love different people, things or activities. Let's make a list.

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Talking Points

- Does the picture include some things that you love?
- O What else would be on your list?
- Are the some things that you like but don't love?
- What's the difference between loving and liking?

Activity

- Make a list of five people or things that you love or like.
- Draw a line with like at one end and love at the other. Then put your list of five people or things in order on the line.
- Share the reasons for your order with a friend.

All You Need is Love – The Beatles

Released in 1967, this song was Britain's contribution to *Our World*, the first live global television link. With about 500 million viewers, it was then the largest audience ever assembled in human history.

Talking Points

- Why do you think the Beatles chose this song for the first ever global TV link?
- Can we show love for people we've never even met?
- Which of these statements do you think is more true: all we need is love, or we all need love?

Activity

 At home or in your class, take a couple of minutes to complete this sentence in any way you want, then share it with others:

If, then all we need is love.

For example: *If we want to stop war and hatred, then all we need is love.*
